

#### Minister's Musings

#### Ministering Alongside God's Angelic Servants

The story of Christmas is one that has shaped the Western World's experience of the winter season. For all the celebrating and hoopla, the story emerged from a mere four chapters of Scripture. Only Luke and Matthew record the events of Jesus entrance into the world. And within those brief accounts, there is nothing more said of Jesus other than what happened to him. He exerts no overt agency. He was conceived, developed, delivered from his mother's body, kept safe by his parents who travel from Bethlehem to Egypt, and eventually to Nazareth. But he performed no active role in any of this. In fact, like most births, the stories are about those impacted by the event, not about the one being born.

In Jesus' birth story, the ones who gain the most prominent notice are the ones we rarely see and even more rarely acknowledge, the angels. In these four chapters, angels appear in six different scenes! In these stories we see angels performing the roles of messenger, worshiper, and protector/warrior. Angels play a large role in our Christmas pageants, holiday decorations, and carols, but it is within these boundaries that our awareness of them tends to find its limits.

The Christmas story is one that invites us into the heart of God in a unique way. It illustrates a God who chose the vulnerability of an infant, entirely dependent on others for both existence and safety. Perhaps that is part of the reason angels play such an important role in the story. They act on behalf of humans in a supportive way, sharing joy, guiding and protecting alongside the human actors. They do not perform the work for humans, but they sure do aid in accompanying them in it.

There is no reason to assume the activity of the angelic realm was limited to this moment in God's story. Hebrews 1:14 states that the role of angels is to act as ministers to us. God appointed them to help us do the work we have been given to do. It makes me wonder how our experience of life, worship, and work might transform if we were more aware of the unseen angels who work and worship alongside us. We are not alone in our pursuit of the Kingdom of God and our efforts to bring God glory. Does our faith extend far enough to allow this great mystery to bolster and motivate our lives and worship?

Madeleine L'engle in talking about her own experience says,


"Bereavement is not the truncation of...love, but one of its regular phases."
