

"MINISTER'S MUSINGS"

Christ the King

Collect: Almighty and everlasting God, whose will it is to restore all things in your well-beloved Son, the King of kings and Lord of lords: Mercifully grant that the peoples of the earth, divided and enslaved by sin, may be freed and brought together under his most gracious rule; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

This Sunday is the feast day of "Christ the King". Unlike most of our feast days, this celebration is relatively new. Pope Pius XI instituted the feast in 1925 as a response to the rise of fascism through Benito Mussolini. His aim was to remind Christians of their fidelity to Christ over and above earthly powers and rulers. At a time in Europe where political fervor was growing and political leaders were looked to as beacons of strength and decisiveness, Christians were invited to remember Christ's ultimate victory.

The tendency of human consciousness is to associate power with dominance. But Jesus illustrates the strength of his kingship through compassion, service, justice, and lovingkindness. To be followers of the way of Christ, the mantle we must take up is one of humility. The Scriptures promise the rise and fall of many human kingdoms. None of them are eternal. None will provide salvation. Only one kingdom will last forever, and we make it our aim to align ourselves with that kingdom's identity. As we face conflict in our political landscape, our Christian hope lies with Jesus Christ, the King of all kings.

The Wealth in Our Tradition

Have you ever noticed the size of our prayer book? It's not as small as our printed bulletins sometimes lead us to believe. In fact, it is filled with loads of tools and liturgies we seldom use. Along with the morning, evening, and noonday services, the lists of lectionary readings, the entire book of Psalms, and extensive prayer lists, there are also five different Eucharistic Prayers. Many people who grew up in The Episcopal Church remember when the Rite One service, composed in Elizabethan English, was the universal language of prayer. In 1979, The Church, recognizing the evolution of modern English, adopted The Book of Common Prayer as it is found in today's pews. Additionally, The Hymnal 1982 contains a multiplicity of both hymns and service music.

Most worshiping communities develop an affinity for one of the Eucharistic Prayers, just like they do for certain hymns and service music. There is enormous benefit and comfort found in repeating the same words in the same ways Sunday after Sunday. There is also tremendous advantage in hearing and participating in the liturgy in different ways. The same thoughts, communicated differently, can transform our way of understanding God, engaging in prayer, and experiencing worship. Those who crafted our prayer book understood the blessing of variance within our worship.

Together, we are going to begin an experiment. As we enter Advent this year, we will embark on a journey of discovery. Instead of Eucharistic Prayer A, we will engage prayer B. We will practice singing, instead of reciting, the Sursum Corda. We may even try some different service music.

As we expand our use of the prayer book, I am eager to hear how each of you experience the service. I invite your impressions, feedback, and engagement with how we shape our liturgy in the future. Feel free to read the other prayers and consider for yourself how the differences impact you. Talk with each other. What do you love? What feels uncomfortable? Is there something you would like to have us try? Our worship is a communal expression and experience before God. Together, let us explore our faith and enter worship with curiosity and the expectation of illumination.



Creation Care Webinar with Bishop Stevenson: Reflections on Hurricane Katrina Date December 12, 2024
Time 4:00 pm - 5:30 pm

Our new era of "extreme weather" promises storms that can smash infrastructure, wash away communities and lives, leave millions without power and the basic necessities of life. We are now also beginning to understand the lingering impact of "invisible" trauma on survivors, and the societal challenge of "climate refugees" within our own borders.

What tools exist for faith leaders, both ordained and lay, to prepare spiritually and to sustain their congregations in this new era? What does spiritual resilience look like for catastrophic weather events and their long aftermath?

Bishop Stevenson took up his post as Canon to the Ordinary in the Diocese of Louisiana shortly before Hurricane Katrina struck in late August, 2005. Hurricane Katrina caused the deaths of at least 1,833 people while hundreds of thousands were displaced. A conservative estimate of damage was \$100 billion.

The Spiritual Resilience Working Group of the diocesan Creation Care Committee invites you to a webinar via Zoom with Bishop Stevenson, where he will share his insights from this experience.
