"MINISTER'S MUSINGS"

#### Living in the Messy Middle

Psalm 63

 1 O God, you are my God; eagerly I seek you; my soul thirsts for you, my flesh faints for you, as in a barren and dry land where there is no water.
2 Therefore I have gazed upon you in your holy place, that I might behold your power and your glory.
3 For your loving-kindness is better than life itself; my lips shall give you praise.

Psalm 63 was written by David while he was in the Judean wilderness, fleeing from a host of enemies, including his son Absalom. The wilderness is a scary place. Threats exist on all sides, from humans, wild creatures, and the climate itself. Resources are thin. There is no clear destination because it is a place or wandering. Being in the wilderness is about enduring without knowing how long or what comes next.

The Psalm 63 reading comes from the lectionary texts associated with this week's commemoration of mystics Richard Rolle (1349), Walter Hilton (1396), and Margery Kempe (1440). These saints lived through The Hundred Years' War, the plague of The Black Death, the Peasant's Revolt, and The Western Schism (The Church's division over papal authority). They knew what it was like to have their social, religious, and political fabric torn apart. By definition, The Middle Ages were a time between times. The world was changing, and the saints clung to their faith to see them through it.

Psalm 63 demonstrates David's way of navigating the messy middle of life in an uncertain and changing world. He is honest about the way it feels. Then, rather than luxuriating in ruminations about the past, when he was the unrivaled and beloved king of the nation, or bemoaning his current frustration and fear, he turns his eyes to the one whose faithfulness remains constant through it all. Even if the threats of the wilderness did steal his life, David knew that God's love is better than life. With that confidence intact, David purposed to praise God.

I am writing this on Tuesday morning after casting my ballot, awaiting an unknown election result. You will be reading this while I am at Convention, casting votes helping determine The Church's future. This week we all walk together through our own experience of the messy middle. While we endure the world shifting under our feet and, perhaps, bemoan our wilderness wanderings, may we follow David's example and take solace in the power and glory of God.

With the current state of the world, doom scrolling is so very easy to do. Given the tensions over our election, wars in places that are considered holy or not by we who are Christian and, of course, the environment. Everyone is voicing their opinion from the fact that the climate crisis is a hoax to the crepe hangers sounding the end of the world for our kind. While not to make light of the seriousness of all the dilemmas facing our species and our world full of so many species, all those created and loved by our God that we worship, are intentionally and lovingly known; Pope Francis writes in <u>Laudate Si': On Care For Our Common Home</u>,"The entire material universe speaks of God's love....Soils, water, mountains:everything is...a caress of God."

It is easy to give into despair, but as Christians, I believe that we MUST not. Neither are we allowed to indulge in inaction. Again in <u>Laudate Si'</u>, Pope Francis reminds us that we must," hear both the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor."

It is our most disadvantaged and the children, especially, that will suffer first, but according to Science and our own observations, we all will, not eventually, but in the near future.

But, Christina Leano writes in <u>Rooted and Rising</u>, that " with Creation, I chant inwardly one of my other favorite phrases from <u>Laudate Si</u>, "for we know that things can change."

She continues,"Thanks to the power of the Holy Spirit and the guidance of God speaking to us through Creation, I live in this faith that things *can* change- the impossible can become possible."

Like Christina, I live into that faith, but it is only with our being the hands and feet of Jesus, that the impossible will be possible. I invite you all to join me in a conversation about establishing "green" teams, whatever we may call it and whatever it may look like.

# Join us as we learn to walk this new and difficult path together.


