under a pile of reindeer, and the season has been a time to birth, most people

today acknowledge it only with a blank look as they rush from activity to activity shopping, decorating, wrapping. For the vast majority of us, December flies by in a flurry of activities, and what is called "the holiday season" turns out to be the most stressful time of the year.

It is also a time of contrasting emotions. We are eager, yet frazzled; sentimental, yet dispirited. One minute we glow at the thought of getting together with our family and friends; the next we feel utterly lonely. Our hope is mingled with dread, our anticipation with despair. We sense the deeper meanings of the season but we cannot seem to grasp them; and in the end, all the yuletide rush leaves us frustrated and drained. Advent has been buried under a pile of twinkle lights, plastic reindeer, and the Grinch.

Even those of us who do not experience such tensions, who genuinely love Christmas, often miss the point. Content with candles, carols and confections, we bask in the warmth of familiar traditions, in reciprocals act of kindness, and in

How many of us remember the harsh realities of Christ's first coming: the forced journey, the closed doors, the dank stable? How many of us share the longing of the ancient prophets, who awaited the Messiah with such aching intensity that they foresaw his arrival hundreds of years before he was born? We are often so dulled by superficial distractions that the feeling we know as 'Christmas cheer' lacks any real connection to the vital spirit that radiated from the manger.

We miss the essence of Christmas if we fail to recognize that it marks something momentous: God's coming into our midst, "Immanuel," God with us. That coming is not just something that happened in the past, in Bethlehem some 2000 years ago. It is a recurring possibility here and now. And thus Advent is not merely about commemorating an event or an anniversary, but is a yearly opportunity for us to consider the future, second Advent—the promised coming of God's kingdom on earth.

The thing is, the love that descended to Bethlehem is not the easy sympathy of an avuncular God, but, as we discover in the Advent readings, a burning fire whose light chases away every shadow, floods every corner, and turns the middle of the

night into noon. This love reveals sin and overcomes it. It conquers darkness with such forcefulness and intensity that, as Mary sings, it scatters the proud, humbles the mighty, feeds the hungry, and sends the rich away empty-handed (Luke 1:51-53).

In order to prepare for the arrival of this love, the Church has given us the season of Advent. In contrast to the frenetic activity of the "holiday" season, Advent encourages us to wait, to expect, to ready ourselves for action: to watch for every opening, and to be willing to risk everything for freedom and a new beginning. to Bethlehem is not the easy sympathy of an avuncular God, but a burning fire whose light chases away every shadow, floods every corner, and turns the middle of the night into noon.

To help us to live into this season, I encourage you to make room, to carve out space in your day, for God, for

prayer, for reflection, for pausing. The Anglican tradition provides a variety of resources for this. In the *Book of Common Prayer*, you'll find services for Morning Prayer (p75), Evening Prayer (p115), and Compline (prayers before bed, p127), as well as shorter Devotions for Individuals and Families (p136). If you prefer to have access to the services electronically, you can find them at The Mission of St. Clare (www.missionstclare.com/english). Moreover, I will also be sharing with you some readings and devotions throughout this month that I hope will help deepen your appreciation and experience of Advent. Keep an eye out for "Observing Advent" emails each week.

May this season be a time of awe, joy, and hope—not in a generic sense, but in response to amazing, wondrous, humbling act of God's coming among us at Christmas and even today. Thanks be to God!
