## An Afterthought

Dear Brothers and sisters in Christ,

I'm not a procrastinator. I'm really not. Sometimes I just want to mole over a matter before responding to it, in a sermon or email or newsletter. At least that's what I tell myself. But now that we are halfway through the fall, halfway through the conventional season of stewardship, I can't really use that as an excuse for not having come up with my "stewardship" article for this month.



Thinking about my procrastination, I recognize that part of it is that I want to have something original, inspiring, engaging to

say about stewardship. I mean, this subject comes up every fall, and we clergy are expected to offer something fresh. And so I was waiting to be inspired. And I waited. But nothing came. So I put it on the backburner for a while. I suppose I could use the excuse that I was gone for two weeks at the first part of stewardship season, but I've been back for a month now, so I don't know how much mileage I can honestly get out of that.

Really, I suppose the issue is I'm just not particularly motivated. I mean, stewardship is not a subject that gets me excited. It's not very "sexy"....all that we have is Gods and we are suppose to give some of it back to God. Yeah, we hear that every year.

Stewardship is not an excited subject. It's not very "sexy." And it often becomes an afterthought. It doesn't make for a very stirring message. It's not like the humbling, awesomeness of Jesus' sacrifice, or the comforting assurance that we are not alone and that God is with us in the pit. It's not even intellectually challenging like the question of why does God let bad things happen or what is our role in our salvation. No, stewardship seems to just be about affirming a fact that we already knew, or that we at least had heard before, something we are familiar with.

So, when stewardship "season" came around this month, I hope you'll forgive me for not jumping at the chance to write on the subject. For several weeks, the subject was an afterthought—"Oh yeah, I'd think, I should really get to work on that." But then I don't.

Reflecting on this, I recognized that that's the issue in itself. We think we know all about stewardship, but when it comes to acting on it, to giving to the church, for the church's mission, it becomes an afterthought. After we've paid all the other bills, after we've made sure we have enough for the things we enjoy, for dinners out and trips and nice things for ourselves, our spouses, our kids, our homes, maybe we remember to give. Believe me, I understand.

But, that is the point of stewardship, what stewardship means. In lifting up stewardship as a theme in this time of the year, at harvest time, during the "ingathering" of the produce and fruit of our labor, we are reminded that all that we have, all that we possess, has been given to us. It's a blessing, a gift from God, given to us in God's providence.

Often times we have the attitude that Bart Simpson had when he was asked to pray at dinner: "Dear God, we paid for all this stuff ourselves. So thanks for nothing!" Yet all that we have—from the food we eat, the skills we've acquired, the education we've received, the opportunities we've taken—have all been given to us. They are a gift. This is not to discount our work or contribution, but it is to remind us where those blessing come from—God.

To bring up the subject of stewardship is also then to invite us to ask, If these things—our possessions, our talents, our wealth—come from God, and are therefore God's, what would God want us to do with them as stewards of God's gifts. What is God's will and design for the gifts that He has given us?

Rather than an afterthought, stewardship challenges us to wrestle with this bigger question—How am I acting as a steward of God's gifts?—before we ask the smaller question of How much am I going to give to the mission and ministry of the church? For the first naturally leads to the second.

Stewardship is a matter of vocation, of living in light of and in response to God's gifts.

Understood in those terms, stewardship becomes a critical matter, a matter of vocation, of living in light of and in response to God. Maybe it's not sexy, but it is critically important, as it embraces the whole of our life as Christians, as disciples.

Ok, so maybe it did take a little "extra" time for me to realize this, but I hope that, in light of this, you might also come to consider how stewardship has been an afterthought for you too, and begin to ask yourself, How am I acting as a steward of God's gifts? For that question is not only relevant this month, but for the whole of our life with God.
