Dear people of Piedmont,

I write you from thousands of miles away, from the land of Israel. This is my second day of my pilgrimage and already I've seen so muchthe ruins of Caesarea where the Roman Governor Pontius Pilate lived, Capernaum, the town from which Jesus did so much of his ministry, and the ruins of Megiddo, which is an important town in central Israel that has seen over twenty distinct settlements going back thousands of years—to name just a few. I'll admit I'm starting to acquire a reputation for myself on the tour for being the last one on the bus after each stop—because I just want to see everything!

It really is valuable to visit the Holy Land, if only to gain a better appreciation and perspective on the terrain and history of this part of the world. One of the insights I've already acquired is one that is immediately obvious once you come here—that is, just how tough it would have been to live in travel here 2000 years ago. There is almost no place that is flat, hills and mountains cover the land. There are not a lot of water sources or vegetation outside of the cultivated (irrigated) areas. The sun is surprisingly strong, blinding and hot, with days in the 80s and 90s even now in October. That doesn't mean the land is without beauty, of course. But being here has made me appreciate the effort and exertion as implied when the gospel says simply, "and Jesus travel from this town to that town." Even when the towns were neighboring, that would mean several hours of walking uphill and downhill in the hot midday sun without any shade. When you're doing something like that, there really isn't anything else to do except to get lost in your thoughts—and to pray.

That observation has led me to wonder if one of the challenges we face as Christians today is not how easy it is to get around, to travel. Sure, such ease of travel is a great blessing, allowing us to access certain markets, to visit distant friends and relatives, and even to travel to the other side of the world! But it comes at a cost, a loss of time to think, to be alone with our thoughts, to be alone with God. Without such automatic

compulsory time by ourselves, it is incumbent upon us modern-day travelers to make time in our day, to allow ourselves space and time for reflection, for questioning, for being quiet, for praying to God. That could be while working in the garden, while driving, while hiking, or while doing any number of other activities, but the point is the need to make space in our days for time with ourselves and with God.

That is just one in-site that I've had from the two days I've been here, and I'm sure I'll have plenty more before the trip is over. But I share that with you, that it may edify and benefit you now.

I would be horribly remiss too, if I didn't take a moment to express my immense gratitude for the generosity you have shown me and sending me on this journey. I was entirely surprised and filled with gratitude at the gift you sent me with. I'm searching for ways in which I may use it to bless our congregation, but I promise you it won't be a t-shirt!

I will look forward to seeing you all in 2 weeks and sharing more of what I've discovered on this journey!
