Minister's Musings

Legacies of Reconciliation

On Monday in Easter Week Pope Francis left this world and entered his eternal rest. April 21st is also the feast day of Saint Anselm. In view of Pope Francis' life and the legacy St. Anselm, it is perhaps not a coincidence that this particular date has linked them for us. The ministry of both these men were marked by navigating the troubled relationships of powerful systems around them to provide growth and peace between people previously divided.

Pope Francis was best known for challenging the boundaries around the Roman Catholic church. He was the first pope to come from outside of Europe. He pushed the church to value the lives and voices of those on the fringes of society, the poor, immigrants, and the LGBTQ community. He appointed a far more diverse group of bishops than any of his predecessors and he worked to create unity across religious lines. His life consistently illustrated the humility of a servant in contrast to the supremacy of his title. He lived 900 years after St. Anselm but shared his heartbeat.

St. Anselm lived in England during the late eleventh century, positioned as a religious leader between warring monarchs, ecclesiastical, and papal authorities. It was during his life that The Great Schism occurred, dividing the Eastern Orthodox and Western Roman Catholic churches. His refusal to deny his moral and theological convictions in the face of such conflict sent him into exile twice. Nevertheless, the church recognized the spirit of wisdom through his life and canonized him, eventually also making him a doctor of the church.

Saint Anselm was noted for laying some sophisticated theological groundwork; he had a scholastically driven mind. While I appreciate his philosophical principles, the thing I find most winsome about him is the appeal he makes to reason, rather than pure deference to Medieval scholasticism. He encouraged people to think, argue, and strive to understand God. He assumed the world was created by a God who desired to be known and would therefore express divinity through the created order. He trusted God to work through the minds and hearts of thinking humans.

In a time when our culture elevates divisiveness and tribalism, I take inspiration from those who illustrate their faith through the wisdom of humility and love.

Collect: Almighty God, whose servant Anselm helped your church to understand its faith in your eternal Being, perfect justice, and saving mercy: Provide your church in all ages with devout and learned scholars and teachers, that we may be able to give a reason for the hope that is in us; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

The Rev. Shirley Smith Graham, Transitional Minister, from the Virginia Episcopal Diocese, worked with Grace and Piedmont last spring, as we began our search for a new priest-in-charge. With her assistance, both church vestries worked to create a document. It consists of three main sections: administrative, financial and spiritual. And contains both churches mission statements. While describing our relationship with Grace church, it serves as a guide should any conflict arise between us. Both Grace and Piedmont agreed to a yearly review of it.
