Minister's Musings

Sustained Through Joy

This week I spent three days at a clergy retreat at Shrine Mont. Our keynote speaker was the Rev. Dr. Bertice Berry, who encouraged us to claim joy. She noted the number of times we push aside, fail to feel, or even notice the good things God offers us as gifts. In view of our current world's events, she encouraged us to look for, receive, and enjoy life's gifts when they come. She affirmed the development of our resilience through pausing to appreciate the joys of life. Too often we downplay compliments, rush past a good laugh, don't notice the love infused through the hug of a friend, or are too filled with anxiety from the news to celebrate simple victories. Bertice affirmed through her own story, the challenges and pains of life. But, greater still, she declared the power of joy to sustain us through those difficulties.

Friday, May 2nd, is the feast day of Saint Athanasius, bishop of Alexandria, arguably one of the most significant theologians in the history of the church. Athanasius lived in the mid fourth century, a time of enormous development and controversy over Christian doctrine. During that time, a man named Arius rose in prominence, teaching against the divinity of Christ and the trinity. Athanasius battled against that heresy, gaining the name "Father of Orthodoxy", helping to develop the theology of the Nicene Creed.

Athanasius was loved and respected by those who shared his views. Heretics and schismatics, however, used all the powers at their disposal to disparage and harm Athanasius and his message. He was exiled five times during his life. He was accused of being too young to be a bishop. To discredit his preaching, he was defamed for committing theft, murder, witchcraft, and even for being responsible for a famine. His life was one of struggle, yet he never wavered on his mission.

We have the privilege to repeat the Creeds every week, crossing ourselves in the name of the trinity, and our familiarity with these truths can numb us to the tears and effort that mapped them for us. The struggles of our lives can fool us into thinking the times in which we live are worse than ever before. Worse still, focusing on the world's failings can deceive us into believing those failings are the thing upon which we should fixate. But Athanasius left us an example of a man whose eyes remained on Christ regardless of those who set themselves against that message.

Our participation in bringing the Kingdom of God starts with acknowledging the fallenness of a broken world, not seeking to escape it. God gives us the gift of joy to sustain us through our work in this world. Seeing joy and naming it when the hurt and fear loom large, is not easy. Allowing ourselves to name and feel it, is the sustenance God offers us for the journey. Even amid pain, God

always offers us goodness. May we have the grace to walk in it, to laugh, dance, and savor the joy. And may our absorption of joy sustain us as it did our brother Saint Athanasius to fulfill the work God has ahead.
