Minister's Musings

Ascension Day

This Thursday, May 29th, is the Feast of the Ascension. It is one of the most important days on the Christian calendar and considered a day of obligatory observance in Roman Catholic circles. This is the day we celebrate, after Jesus' death and resurrection, when he was "taken up" into Heaven. We commemorate Jesus' death for freeing us from sin. But we rejoice even more in his ascension because through it he opened for US the door to heaven. This day exults in one of the most foundational hopes of Christendom. Because of his bodily ascension into heaven, we believe that we too will be raised and, in our flesh, see God. Hallelujah!

As a theologian, I feel the joyful exultation of the day's significance. But as a human, I can't help but feel the ache, confusion, and trepidation of seeing Jesus vanish from sight. The apostles would spend the next nine days in prayer before God's presence through the Holy Spirit would come and remain with them. Those days together must have felt long indeed. Surely their faith must have been tested in the interminable silence of that time. The most profound grace of the story is that they waited together. They may have felt bereft of Jesus' physical presence, but they had each other.

Most of us, at some point, have felt the absence of Christ's presence. Theologically we know God is with us, but that 18" distance between our head and heart can sometimes seem more like 18 miles. Our feelings of loss, loneliness, fear, and sadness can overwhelm our ability to feel in our bodies what our minds believe is true. This story says a "a cloud received" Jesus from their sight. Clouds are often used in Scripture to communicate the veil that makes a separation between earthly and heavenly realities. These clouds typically portend blessing and provision for God's people, but they require faith to see through. Sometimes we, like the disciples, must depend on our community, our friends, the church, and the faithful of every age to strengthen us when our trust fails. Together we pray, together we hope, and together we will see the faithfulness of God.

May we be a people who help to fortify the faith of one another, seeking and providing solace together.
